# Authenticity Is Your Superpower

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Spoiler Alert: your weird quirks, heartfelt passions, and awkward jokes?

*They're networking gold.*

Forget robotic introductions and memorize this elevator pitches. Instead, tell your story—how you got here, the lessons you've learned, and where your curiosity is heading next.

Ask questions like a journalist on good coffee. What excites this person? What challenge are they facing? What's lighting them up lately? Genuine curiosity goes further than polished perfection ever could.

Think of networking as connecting, not convincing. Your vibe attracts your tribe, and vulnerability builds deeper rapport than buzzwords ever will.



## TAKE ACTION:

- Make a list of three questions that you can always have ready when meeting new people—questions you're genuinely curious about, not ones you think you should ask. This isn't just for networking events; it could be meeting a new neighbor, another parent at a school event, or someone new in your organization.
- Flip the script. Be ready to share your own answers if asked. How can you respond in a way that lets someone really see you—your values, quirks, and what genuinely excites you—so the conversation becomes a real connection, not just a performance?
- If a moment feels awkward, stay in it. Authentic connection often starts right after the script runs out.

# Relationships, Not Transactions

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Here's the truth no one tells you: networking isn't a business card exchange—it's a long-term relationship. You can't collect people in your contacts like your trophies from high school and expect magic.

## *Consistency is queen.*

Keep in touch. Send a follow-up note that doesn't sound robotic—something like, "Our coffee chat made my Tuesday a thousand times better." When people see you care, they'll remember you.

Mentorship and sponsorship are like the friendship bracelets of the professional world. Seek those who lift others, and return the energy. Bonus points if your circle spans industries—lawyers, artists, coders, and activists all bring unique energy to your personal ecosystem.

Diverse networks don't just open doors—they build bridges.

## **TAKE ACTION:**

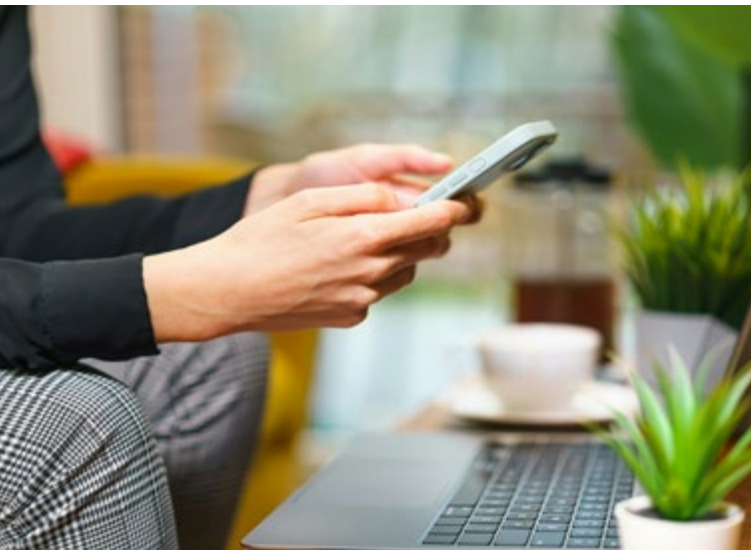
- Make a list of ten people in your network who stand out—not because of their titles, but because they expanded how you think, inspired you to try something new, or supported you in an unexpected way.
- Next to each name, note where and how you met. Look for patterns in the spaces, moments, or experiences that led to those connections.
- Choose one person from the list and reach out this week with a simple, genuine note—no agenda required.

# Networking Without the Cringe

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Let's get something straight: you don't need to attend every mixer or post daily on LinkedIn to stay relevant.

The smartest women today *network with intention, not exhaustion.*



Start with micro-habits: a “Connection Monday” where you DM someone you admire, or share an article that made you think of a colleague. Put it this way... Ten minutes a week making authentic connections beats one big, fake networking binge every six months.

Try small, invite-only dinners or intimate pop-ups—the kind of events where laughter is loud, conversations are deep, and the only thing exchanged faster than contact info is mutual support. And remember: social media is a tool, not a trap. Stay engaged, but make your interactions real. Thoughtful comments are better received than generic “Love this!” replies every day of the week.

## TAKE ACTION:

- Schedule small, consistent, and repeatable ways to stay connected that fit your life—whether that’s a weekly check-in, a monthly coffee, or a thoughtful message when someone crosses your mind. Set 15-minute calendar blocks NOW so it actually happens.
- Prioritize responding to people who reach out in ways that feel genuine and aligned. You don’t owe everyone a reply—but you do owe yourself relationships that feel reciprocal.
- Release the pressure to “do it all.” One meaningful touchpoint is more powerful than dozens of surface-level interactions.

# Ditch the Barriers, Keep the Boundaries

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We've all been there—the awkward handshake, the mansplainer, the post-event exhaustion that makes you swear off all human contact.

*Guess what?*

**You get to rewrite that script.**

For introverts, virtual networking and written outreach can be your secret weapons. LinkedIn messages, thoughtful emails, or witty notes feel way more natural than forced small talk in a crowded ballroom.

Above all, honor your energy.

Networking is self-expanding, not self-draining. Take breaks. Say no. Protect the vibes.

## **TAKE ACTION:**

- Before accepting an invite, ask yourself: Will this expand my energy or drain it? Let the answer guide your yes—or your no.
- Practice setting one clear, kind boundary this week—whether that's leaving early, opting for a virtual connection, or declining without over-explaining.
- When someone sets a boundary with you, respect it without taking it personally. Strong networks are built on mutual respect, not constant availability.



# Make Networking Yours

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Cookie-cutter strategies are out.

Your networking style should fit your life, your personality, and your calendar (yes, *“Introvert Hours Only”* is valid).

Create a plan that feels as effortless as brunch with a friend: three coffee dates, two check-in messages, and one bold reach-out a month. Keep it light, flexible, and fun.

Write down your goals—but skip the guilt traps. Maybe you want to find a mentor, break into a new industry, or just feel more connected. Whatever it is, define success your way and celebrate every step forward.

## TAKE ACTION:

- Set 1-3 simple networking intentions for the next quarter. Keep them specific but flexible and be sure they fit your energy, schedule, and season in life.
- Journal what an ideal mentor looks like to you right now. What kind of support, perspective, or accountability do you need most?
- Design one networking habit that actually sounds fun—something you’d look forward to doing even if there were no “outcome.”

# The New Networking

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This isn't about power suits, perfect pitches, or working the room. It's about *connection, curiosity, and confidence*—the things women have always done best.



So show up. Share your story. Celebrate others shamelessly. Send that message. Host that dinner. Be the root system that nourishes others—and watch your own garden grow.
